Whole School Attendance

Please find below, a letter that was sent out about attendance in September 2024. If you have any questions, please let us know.

Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope this letter finds you well. We wanted to share some important information regarding changes to the law around school attendance and how they might affect you and your child.

At St. Mary's, we understand that there are times when children need to miss school, such as when they are unwell. However, the government has strict guidelines that discourage absences unless there are exceptional circumstances. If you need to request time off for your child, please make sure to fill out the 'Leave of Absence Exceptional Circumstances' form and submit it to the Headteacher for approval.

If your child has an unauthorised absence from school, it's important to be aware that this could be considered an offence under the Education Act 1996. In such cases, we may need to ask Cornwall Council to issue a Penalty Notice. This fine is £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid between 21 and 28 days. The fine is per parent, per child.

If unauthorised absences happen again within a 3-year period, further Penalty Notices may be issued, this time with a fine of £160, again per parent and per child. There's a limit of two fines per parent within this three-year period. After this, more serious steps, such as a parenting order or legal prosecution, may be considered.

Please remember that if a Penalty Notice isn't paid, legal action might be taken, and this could result in a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also seek to recover the legal costs of pursuing the matter. In extreme cases, it's even possible for a custodial sentence to be imposed.

The funds raised from fines are used only to cover the costs of running the system and to help provide attendance support, with any surplus being returned to the government. The school does not receive any funds.

The term 'parent' is defined broadly under the Education Act 1996 and includes not only natural parents but also anyone who has parental responsibility or who is caring for the child.

We understand that school attendance can sometimes be difficult, and we're here to support you. If you have any questions, concerns, or would like some guidance on helping your child attend school regularly, please don't hesitate to get in touch. We are committed to working with you to ensure your child gets the most out of their time at St. Mary's and reaches their full potential.

Executive Function!

Executive functioning skills are essential for helping children stay organised, manage their time, focus, and solve problems. These important life skills develop gradually, and with a little support at home, children can grow more confident and independent.

One of the best ways to build these skills is through play and everyday routines. Here are some practical ways to help your child strengthen their executive functioning skills in a safe and supportive environment:

Encourage Turn-Taking and Playing Games

Games that involve turn-taking, sharing, and following rules are excellent for teaching patience, self-control, and how to handle winning and losing. Board games, card games, and even simple playground games allow children to manage emotions in a low-pressure setting while having fun.

Teach Emotional Control Through Play

Support your child in recognising and managing their emotions by encouraging them to pause, take deep breaths, and express their feelings calmly. Role-playing games and storytelling can help children explore emotions in a safe space.

3. Let Them Help Plan

Involve your child in planning family activities, making shopping lists, or preparing for a trip. This gives them a chance to practice thinking ahead and problem-solving while feeling included and valued.

4. Stick to Routines

A consistent routine for meals, homework, and bedtime helps children feel secure and understand what to expect. Visual checklists and calendars can make routines easier to follow and encourage independence.

5. Stay Organised Together

Help your child create organised spaces for their belongings. Labelled bins, a tidy homework station, or a family calendar for upcoming events can teach responsibility and time management.

6. Set Small, Achievable Goals

Work with your child to set simple goals, like completing a puzzle or tidying their room, and celebrate their progress. This builds confidence and teaches persistence.

7. Talk Through Challenges

Model problem-solving by thinking out loud and breaking tasks into smaller steps. This helps your child learn how to approach challenges calmly and thoughtfully.

8. Limit Distractions

Provide a quiet, clutter-free space for homework or reading. Reducing screen time during focused activities can help children concentrate and stay on task.

By focusing on turn-taking, sharing, and emotional regulation through play and daily routines, you can help your child develop important life skills in a supportive and fun way.

Self-Control: Managing impulses to stay in role and perform actions at the right time.

Task Initiation and Persistence: Starting new actions confidently and continuing through the entire routine.

Monster Makers!


